C64 Borough Council business

Borough Councillors Hill, McCarthy and Wright reported on matters under consideration by the Borough Council relating to the parish and on issues that the Borough Ward members had acted on for residents including:

- Environmental Health officers had confirmed that the Pit Stop Café had been licensed to serve food.
- The Borough Council had repaired the timber fence on the highway verge adjacent to Martinscroft Green.
- The Borough Council was to plant 3 tree saplings in spring 2019 to replace those damaged in the highway verge on Manchester Road.
- Four bus shelters had recently vandalised with similar damage to other shelters in the Borough. Police were investigating the incidents and Borough Council officers were considering repair work.
- Consideration had been given to planning applications from residents in Bowfell Grove to remove trees that were subject to Tree Preservation Orders.
- The access road from Gig Lane to the Grange Employment Area had been cleared. A request had been made for a metal chicane at the entrance from Gig Lane to replace the concrete triangular barrier.
- A complaint from a resident that the extension of the Holes Lane Surgery would result in a loss of parking spaces for staff and patients had been investigated. Additional spaces would be provided as part of the development.
- Residents of Poulton Crescent had made representations regarding the former play area. Officers were considering options for the future use of the land.
- Consideration was being given by the Borough Council to the use of the funding provided by the Government for repairs to pot holes and other highways maintenance.
- Representations from a resident at the delay by the Borough Council in determining a planning application for a household development had been investigated.
- Representations from residents had been investigated regarding the arrangements for the provision of flu vaccine to patients. This was understood to be caused by the National Health Service phased roll out of the vaccine nationwide that was planned to be completed by the end of December.

- Officers were working with the police on issues relating to anti-social behaviour.
- Residents had expressed concern at the recent traffic incident on Hillock Lane. A report from the police was awaited.
- A meeting was to be held with the Head Teacher of Woolston Community Primary School following the concern of residents at traffic issues.

The Chairman expressed his concern at the difficulty in accessing information relating to council committees. The Borough Council's website Committee Information Management System (CMIS) had been hacked and this had restricted access to information. It was noted that a list of committee meetings had been provided on the website as a temporary solution. Further representations were to be made to the Chief Executive on the restoration of the system.

Members considered the concern of residents at the traffic and parking congestion believed to be caused mainly by customers of the Co-op Food Store in Holes Lane. The view was expressed that waiting restrictions would not provide a solution to this problem and other options needed to be considered.

C66 Reports from members appointed to local bodies

The Council received reports from members who were appointed by the Council or other organisations on local bodies including:

New Cut Heritage and Ecology Trail Group – Councillor J Greenslade reported on the meeting of the group held on 1 October 2018 and the work being carried out by the group. The main business had related to Paddington Meadows. Ideas had been invited for fund raising to assist the work of the group and an approach was being considered to the Community Fund. Litter picking took place every month. A discussion had also been held on an event to mark the completion of the area at the Woolston Lock. The next meeting was to be held on 26 November 2018.

Friends of Woolston Park – Councillor MH Greenslade reported that no meeting of the group had been held since the last council meeting. The 2018 Show had been short of the number of volunteer helpers needed and consideration may need to be given to paid help for some work in planning future shows. It was noted that a substantial area of reed bed had been cleared by

Carbon Landscape and FoWP volunteers around the pond together with some other vegetation clearance nearby. The need for repairs to the leaking roof of the disabled person's toilets at the Ranger Cabin had been reported to the Borough Council.

Public Rights of Way Forum – The next meeting of the Forum was to be held on 4 January 2019. Other meetings were to be held on 4 April, 8 August and 12 December 2019. The Council noted that a letter of appreciation had been sent to Mr J Thorp on his retirement from the Borough Council for his work in Woolston over many years as the officer responsible for Public Rights of Way.

Other reports

Parish Council liaison meeting – The Chairman, Councillor Nowell and Councillor Banner reported on the meeting held on 1 October 2018. A copy of the slide presentation to the meeting on the effect on parish precepts from 2019-20 following changes to the Council Tax Support Allowance had been sent to all members. Councillors Nowell and McCarthy had attended the Code of Conduct Training held on 22 October 2018 provided by the Borough Council.

Lourdes report from members of St Peters' Youth Group – the Council received a report from Amy Lea on behalf of the group for the assistance provided to the volunteer helpers who attended Lourdes this year.

Tree planting ceremony – the council recorded their thanks to Helen Jones, Warrington North MP, for the gift of a tree to the people of Woolston, planted on a land at Runnymede, adjacent to Manchester Road, as part of Her Majesty the Queen's Commonwealth Canopy.

<u>C67 Parish Path Warden report and update on the Carbon Landscape partnership plans</u></u>

Councillor Nowell reported on the work of the Carbon Landscape project of which he was a volunteer. Carbon Landscape is a £3.2M project funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund and has three broad objectives:

- Restoration to continue restoring a derelict landscape connecting wild areas to offer a better chance for wildlife;
- Access to reconnect people to the land;
- Understanding to raise awareness and remind local residents that this is their landscape.

The project area covering Wigan, Salford and Warrington includes former coalfields to the north and west and mosslands and riverside environments to the south, providing a combination of peatscapes and brownfield sites. Three core zones have been identified: the Flashes; the Mosslands; and the Mersey Wetlands Corridor. The project relies on volunteers for the delivery of schemes and training is provided by the project.

In Warrington there was a partnership of 14 members including the Woolston Eyes Group, LiveWire, Cheshire Wildlife Trust and the Lancashire Wildlife Trust and the area has an Engagement Officer. One scheme under consideration was to link the nature reserves.

Councillor Nowell gave details of matters reported to the Borough Council relating to public footpaths:

Path 25 new gravel surface covering for approximately 20 yards along the paddock fence line from Battery Lane Green space.

No current interference with path 20 which crosses New Cut Lane by construction work on Woolston Community Recycling Centre.

Matter reported for information. Wooden goalpost removed from Timberscombe Gardens and disposed of in the New Cut canal alongside path 23. Retrieved by Warrington BC.

2018/33624 - 9 Bowfell Grove - TPO – G1 Lime x14 proposed crown thin by 20%, reduce side laterals by 2-3 metres from ground level predominantly laterals superseding the remaining crown to achieve overall balance appearance. Crown lift to 5 metres from ground level.

2018/33632 – 80 Dam Lane – change of use - proposed change of use from Beauty Salon (sui generis) to Tattoo Studio (sui generis)
